## FROM THE SUPERINTENDENTS DESK

Although the weather has been very good to us this fall, we know changes are around the corner.
Cold winter winds mixed with snowy conditions can make it very difficult and
 dangerous for students and transportation.
As superintendent of the school, it is my duty to determine if school should be cancelled or have a delayed start.
With our Blackboard Connect communication program, you will receive a voice mail, email and text informing you of cancellation or delays.

## Please make sure your contact information is updated and current with the school's Powerschool information system to ensure you receive these messages. Contact the

school office if you need to update a phone number or email.
I will also contact local radio and TV stations with this information, but Blackboard will be your first and quickest means of receiving this information.
In an attempt to facilitate the planning process, I am offering the following information:
When there is a credible potential of severe winter weather, I will attempt to make a determination by 6:00 AM if we are going to cancel school or simply have a delayed start to the school day.
If your kids ride the bus, and we have a one or two hour delay to the start of the school day, simply add the one or two hours to their usual pick-up time-this should provide parents with a reasonable estimate as to when to expect the bus to arrive.
Please have a plan in place for your children. Winter weather can surprise us and quick decisions need to be made.
 Having a family plan in place now will help you if transitions are necessary if school is cancelled.

- Apply to your top college choices (at least 3 before Thanksgiving).
- Retake the ACT and/or SAT. Colleges use your best scores for college admission and scholarships.
- Get serious about applying for scholarships. Use the ScholarshipQuest tool on EducationQuest.org for Nebraska-based scholarships and a list of national search sites.
- Students and parents are now able to see an updated list of scholarship opportunities as they become available.
- Look for the tab called "Scholarship Central" on the school website or follow this link: Scholarship Central. At this time, local scholarships are not listed, but they will be added throughout the year.
