## Superintendent's Desk

### Greenhouse coming to FPS!!!!

Last year, our FFA teacher, Amy Kohtz, applied and received a grant to build a greenhouse. After a year of planning and COVID derailments, we are breaking ground this week. The greenhouse will be 30" x 48" and placed west of the school by the van garage. The total cost of the project is \$135,000 in which the majority is funded through grants from the School Foundation, Friend Area Fund, and Nebraska FFA Foundation.

The greenhouse will be a K-12 facility with educational components such as growing and raising plants from seeds. The FFA students will manage the greenhouse and have many projects that enhance their hands-on learning experiences. We will also be pouring a stem wall, which will allow for projects that include bringing in livestock for live birth experiences and animal care. The possibilities with the new structure are endless, and we are excited to see all the opportunities.

The students will also use the greenhouse to grow and sell plants and produce, plus host a community greenhouse night in the spring. The revenue earned will help fund and maintain future projects while also teaching students about profit margins, inventory control, break-even analysis, marketing, plant care, and maintenance. As you can see, this is a great new addition to FPS which will benefit all students. I would like to thank all those who donated toward the project. We appreciate the support given to our students.

### Spring Flowers and Safety Tips Are Blooming...

Spring is a great time for family fun and activities! A few safety tips to keep the fun times healthy...

- \* Allergy season is upon us. Allergies can cause a multitude of symptoms including sniffling, sneezing, coughing, itchy or puffy eyes, post nasal drip, headaches and earaches, to name a few. Consult with your doctor about the best treatment options, and limit your time outdoors on days when the pollen or mold counts are high; you can check daily particulate counts on the Weather Channel.
- \* Start thinking about sunscreen. As short sleeve weather approaches, don't forget to be prepared with sunscreen. That first seasonal sunburn is the most damaging to the skin and can surprise you even on a cool spring day. Apply sunscreen every few hours for the most effective coverage, and don't forget to protect your eyes with sunglasses or a breathable hat!
- \* Make outdoor time a safe time by wearing a helmet when riding bikes, skateboards, and scooters. Knee pads and elbow pads are easy to wear and add even more protection.
- \* Poison Ivy, Oak, and Sumac contain oil causing an allergic skin reaction that looks like swollen, itchy, red bumps and blisters wherever the oil has touched the skin. Check the areas around your home and teach your kids to recognize and avoid these plants.
- \* Stinging insects will soon be back. If you are stung, remove the stinger as soon as possible with a scraping motion. Wash with soap and water and apply a cold compress. If trouble breathing, severe swelling or fainting occurs, call 911 right away.
- \* Ticks can be a problem in our area...use tweezers or fingers to grasp as close to the head as possible and pull the tick away from where it is attached. Call the pediatrician for symptoms of a rash or fever following exposure.
- \* Remind children not to approach an unknown animal and not to disturb a sleeping animal or any animal that is eating. If a bite occurs, wash wounds well with soap and water and call the pediatrician.
- \* Remember to hydrate. Sweat and exercise deplete the body of essential fluids, so keep those water bottles filled and close by!

Here's how to make your final college decision.

Compare your college acceptance letters, financial aid award notifications, and campus visit notes. List the pros and cons of each school using the following criteria:

Location – Is the college too close? If you come home every weekend, you won't experience true campus life. Is the college too far away? If so, you may not make it home as often as you'd like.

**Cost** – Can your family afford the school? What can you expect for financial aid beyond your freshman year? Did you receive renewable scholarships? How much in <u>student and parent loans</u> will be needed to cover expenses?

**Academic program** – Which college offers the degree program that best fits your career interests? What happens if you change majors? Does the college offer other degree programs that interest you?

Student life – Does the school offer activities you will enjoy? If you plan to live on campus, do you like the housing arrangements? Will you have an opportunity to work on or near campus?

Make your final decision by May 1 and then notify the colleges you're rejecting so they can offer your spot, and financial aid, to another student.

### EMF FFA Members Shine at District Career Development Event Competitions

On March 2nd, the EMF FFA Chapter traveled to Centennial High School to compete in Career Development Events. There are 22 different CDE's that students can compete in over the course of the year, from milk product evaluation to floriculture. On March 2<sup>nd</sup>, the chapter competed in Ag Sales, Livestock Management, Ag Technology/Mech, Floriculture, Natural Resources, Agronomy, and Veterinary Science. We had the following results:

- Ag Sales team of Kiarra Fennel, Vivian Weber, Avery Kraus, and Kiah Songster
  - District champions out of 8 teams and qualified for state
    - Vivian placed 1st individually
  - Kiarra placed 2nd individually
- Floriculture team of Cameryn Brandt, Abby Eberspacher, Shelby Lawver, and Vivian Weber
  - 4th place out of 17 teams and qualified for state
  - Vivian placed 3rd individually
  - Shelby placed 15th individually
- Vet Science team of Zoey Borgman, Abby Eberspacher, Avery Kraus, and Shyann Smith
  - 4th place out of 18 teams and the alternate to go to state
  - Abby placed 9th individually
  - Zoey placed 11th individually
  - Shyann placed 16th individually
- Livestock Management team of Peyton Pribyl, Cade Kresak, Casey Underwood, Kole Svec, and Clint Oldehoeft
   6th place out of 26 teams and only 2 points from qualifying for state
- Natural Resource team of Christian Weber, Jacob Weber, Fred Hausman, and Shelby Lawer
   6th place out of 18 teams and qualified for state
- Ag Tech/Mech team of Ben Bartu, Kole Svec, Casey Underwood, and Jacob Weber
  - 4th place out of 13 teams and qualified for state
- o Agronomy team of Jackson Beethe, Jaiden Papik, Spencer Eberspacher, and Chase Svehla
  - 3rd place out of 9 teams and gualified for state
  - Jaiden placed 7th individually
  - Chase placed 10th individually
  - Spencer placed 12th individually

We are very proud of all of our members' accomplishments at these events and for working and studying consistently to prepare for this event. Teams that are qualified will be competing virtually this year at the end of March and through the beginning of April. Additionally, Abby Eberspacher submitted a Specialty Crop Proficiency Award at the district level and won districts. Her application was forwarded to the state level, and she is 1 of 3 students who will interview at state in this category. Proficiency Awards are based on a student's SAE and give students the opportunities to write/share about skills learned, challenges of their SAE, production financial analysis and pictures of them working on their SAE. Additionally, in February, Jaiden Papik submitted her application for her State FFA Degree. This is one of the highest honors that an FFA member can receive and is based on a student's SAE and their ability to keep financial records, work hours, log community service hours, and show over 500 points in leadership development. Jaiden interviewed and passed her record book evaluation and her interview. She will receive her degree in April and be honored during the State Degree Ceremony virtually in April. The chapter is looking forward to hosting their chapter banquet on April 29th at Exeter High School to celebrate a year of accomplishments and to salute our graduating seniors.
